

Ryan's Story - Loved Beyond Belief

- Self-Defense Training:

 - Later, Ryan revealed he had befriended the bully, causing mixed emotions in Mr. Halligan.

2.4. Cyberbullying and Online Harassment

- Summer of 2003:
 - Ryan became increasingly attached to his computer, mainly using AOL Instant Messaging (AIM).
 - Adherence to strict internet safety rules:
 - No chatting with strangers.
 - No sharing of personal information.
 - No secret passwords.
 - Despite rules, Ryan was involved in online interactions that led to rumors.
- Discovery of Online Abuse:
 - No suicide note was found, which is common in suicides.
 - Father accessed Ryan's AOL account to uncover the reasons behind Ryan's suicide.
 - Found extensive bullying and rumors, including claims about Ryan's sexuality.

2.5. Confrontation with the Bully

- Investigation Findings:
 - The bully in middle school had spread rumors Ryan was gay based on a personal story Ryan shared with him.

- A Girl he approached online pretended to like him throughout the summer but secretly ridiculed him at the same time. She told him at the start of eighth grade that he was a loser.
- On his last day, he said to her, “It’s girls like you that make me want to kill myself.”
- Immediate Concern for the Girl
 - The whole school gained up on her upon learning what Ryan had said to her; she became suicidal.
 - Mr. Halligan asked to meet with her and forgave her for her part in Ryan’s Story. Recognizing it was not just about her but all of the other bullying too that led to his depression.
- Attempt at Revenge:
 - Mr Halligan contemplated confronting the bully physically.
 - Instead, he chose to speak with the bully's family.
- Meeting with the Bully:
 - Visited the bully's family to discuss the impact of his actions.
 - The bully broke down in tears and apologized sincerely.
 - Mr Halligan chose forgiveness over revenge, emphasizing its importance.

2.6. Aftermath and Reflections

- Impact on Family:
 - Megan, Ryan's sister, was deeply affected by his death.
 - Raphael, Ryan's best friend, was also profoundly impacted.
- Lessons Learned:
 - Importance of addressing bullying and cyberbullying.
 - The role of bystanders in preventing bullying.
 - Encouragement to seek help for those struggling with depression.
